## 2013 COLLOQUIUM COLLECTING KNOWLEDGE: NEW DIALOGUES ON MCCORD MUSEUM COLLECTIONS

**Montreal, October 31, 2013 –** The McCord Museum is pleased to present the colloquium *Collecting Knowledge: New Dialogues on McCord Museum Collections*, which will be held November 7 to 9, 2013 as part of the Museum's involvement in the Université du Québec à Montréal (UQAM) research program entitled *Montréal, plaque tournante des échanges : histoire, patrimoine, devenir.* 

The colloquium will bring together a number of researchers whose work has focused on the rich collections of the McCord Museum. They will share the results of their research with their colleagues, Museum curators and personnel, and members of the public interested in Montreal and the pivotal role it has played in Canadian history.

The initiative aims to open a dialogue on new areas of research and spur discussion to increase knowledge about the Museum's collections, which represent one of the largest sources of documentation and original artefacts in Canada for historical research. The event will also present the results of recent research on illustrating some of the new ways that the McCord Museum's historical collections are being used studied.

"This colloquium is yet another example of our commitment to research and the dissemination of our collections," stated Suzanne Sauvage, President and Chief Executive Officer of the McCord Museum. "One of our priorities is to increase knowledge about our collections and foster dialogue with the research community in order to widely promote the history of Montreal."

## **Diverse program**

The program includes tours of the Museum's archives and exhibitions as well as many discussion forums.

Among the program highlights, on Thursday November 7, at 6 p.m., the event will open with *Voices from The Vaults: Object Biography and McCord Museum Collections*, chaired by Joanne Burgess of the Université du Québec à Montréal, and facilitated by Anne MacKay, Head, Conservation, Guislaine Lemay, Curator, Ethnology and Archaeology, and Cynthia Cooper, Curator, Costume and Textiles. The event will be followed by a cocktail reception at 7:30 p.m.

Also not to be missed is the keynote address on Friday, November 8 at 9 a.m. by Jacques Mathieu, Professor Emeritus at Université Laval and a historian who specializes in New France. His talk, entitled *Journal intime de l'objet*, will explore the ways that a museum artefact can be documented, studied, analyzed and presented to diverse audiences.
