HARRY SUTCLIFFE – STROLLING THROUGH MONTREAL
AN OUTDOOR EXHIBITION ON MCGILL COLLEGE AVENUE
THE FIRST EXHIBITION DEVOTED TO THE CANADIAN PHOTOGRAPHER

Montreal, **June 13**, **2014** – The McCord Museum is pleased to announce *Harry Sutcliffe – Strolling Through Montreal*, the ninth edition of its outdoor exhibition on McGill College Avenue, from June 13 to October 19, 2014. The exhibition is presented by BMO Financial Group. "We're delighted with this exhibition, the first ever devoted to this Canadian photographer of British origin. The 25 selected works highlight the daily atmosphere of Montreal's parks and squares in the 1920s and 1930s. It was a period during which city life reflected a certain, prosperity, tranquility and joie de vivre," said Suzanne Sauvage, President and CEO of the Museum.

The theme chosen for the exhibition fits with summer, the best time of the year to be strolling outdoors, a lost art in our hurried age. Families in canoes on a pond in Lafontaine Park, beach bathing on Île Sainte-Hélène in 1936, children playing near Beaver Lake or on bicycles along the edge of Rivière-des-Prairies, a meal at the Chalet du Mont-Royal restaurant on a sunny day, or a break under shady trees in Dominion Square – the pictures show the simple pleasures we enjoy just as much today. There will also be a few winter scenes adding a cool breeze to the exhibition in Montreal's summer heat.

The photos are from Harry Sutcliffe's photo archives, recently acquired by the McCord Museum through a donation from the artist's great-grandson, Paul Sutcliffe. In 2013, this gift of approximately 2,000 photographs was certified as Canadian cultural property. The Museum also benefitted from a subsidy provided by the Réseau québécois de numérisation patrimoniale, with financial support from the Ministère de la Culture et des Communications, in order to preserve exceptional documents from the City of Montreal and villages in what is currently the Laval area, from 1920 to 1940. The McCord Museum now holds the largest collection of the artist's photographs in Canada, thank to Peter, Paul, Robert and Carolyn Sutcliffe.

Harry Sutcliffe was born in Patricroft, England in 1878 and died in Laval-des-Rapides, Quebec in 1942. He worked for the Wabasso Cotton Company in Trois-Rivières and was posted in Europe during the Great War. Harry Sutcliffe devoted himself to photographing Montreal after settling in Laval-des-Rapides. He created some of the finest postcards of Montreal in the 1920s and 1930s. The photographer's style – his choice of subjects and composition – exhibited a clear sense of artistic exploration. He was influenced by the romantic aesthetic of the end of the 19th century in England, where he practiced photography before immigrating to Canada in 1913. He printed the postcards himself by placing a negative in contact with sensitized Azo or Velox paper. The subject was usually handwritten at the

bottom of each card, followed by the signature *HS*. Harry Sutcliffe took part in competitions in Montreal and England, and his works were published in the arts pages of several newspapers.

Certain subjects recurred throughout his work, such as his daughter Florence, boats, natural landscapes or landscapes and nature, ice on the river and sunshine on water. There are also some series featuring Mount Royal Park and St. Joseph's Oratory among other locations. Montreal buildings, monuments and public squares are also a dominant theme, appearing according to season and framed in various ways at different angles. The photographer clearly liked to illustrate the life of the city by showing passersby in the streets, squares and parks.

Hélène Samson, curator, Notman Photographic Archives, is also curator of *Harry Sutcliffe – Strolling Through Montreal*. The exhibition was made possible through the support of BMO Financial Group, Rio Tinto Alcan, Astral, *The Gazette*, the Borough of Ville-Marie and BUSAC Real Estate.
