## LAST CHANCE TO SEE THE HORST: PHOTOGRAPHER OF STYLE EXHIBITION AT THE McCORD MUSEUM

Montreal, August 10, 2015 – The critically acclaimed exhibition Horst: Photographer of Style, which has already drawn more than 50,000 visitors, is nearing the end of its stay at the McCord Museum. With the exhibition ending on August 23, just a couple of weeks remain for the public to discover this major retrospective of the works of Horst P. Horst in a North American exclusive produced by the Victoria and Albert Museum in London. Museum hours are also being extended to enable as many visitors as possible to see the exhibition, which, when it leaves Montreal will head to Europe, with a first stop at the Nederlands Fotomuseum in Rotterdam, Holland, before moving on to the NRW-Forum Düsseldorf in Germany.

Legendary German-American artist Horst was one of the 20<sup>th</sup> century's most influential fashion and portrait photographers. The exhibition features more than 250 vintage shots that transcend time. In addition to the photographs, the retrospective displays sketchbooks, a short film, archival footage, contact sheets and magazines, as well as eight haute couture dresses from celebrated designers Chanel, Molyneux, Lanvin, Schiaparelli, Maggy Rouff and Vionnet, all from the Victoria and Albert Museum collection.

Also included in the exhibition are a number of less well-known aspects of Horst's work: nude studies, travel shots from the Middle East, patterns created from natural forms, interiors and portraits. It chronicles his creative process and artistic influences, touching notably on his interest in ancient Classical art, particularly Greco-Roman sculpture, the Bauhaus ideals of modern design, and Surrealism in 1930s Paris. Visitors will discover in the exhibition the legacy of a master photographer. The four primary lenders are the Horst Estate; R. J. Horst; the Condé Nast Archive in New York; and the archives of Paris Vogue.

#### Extended hours



#### Film screening at the McCord Museum

On Wednesday, August 19, 2015, at 6 p.m., the McCord Museum will present the documentary Horst: Sixty Years and Still in Vogue in its original English version without subtitles. This film by Gerald Scarfe presents a comprehensive portrait of the photographer, beginning with his emergence in Paris between the two world wars

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and the pursuit of his career in the United Sates in the late 1930s. Using interviews with the photographer, family members and colleagues, Scarfe looks at his various creative periods. The filmmaker focuses on Horst's relationships with such acclaimed artists as Dalì and Jean Cocteau, as well as major figures in the fashion world, including Coco Chanel. Heavily illustrated, this documentary highlighting Horst's importance as a photographer received recognition during Montreal's International Festival of Films on Art in 1993. Free activity. #### Photo shoot: Lights on Horst! at the 2015 Fashion & Design Festival

**On Wednesday, August 19, 2015, from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m.,** the public is invited to attend a one-of-a-kind event presented by the McCord Museum: a live photo shoot by photographer Olivier Samson-Arcand of OSA Image, inspired by the exhibition *Horst: Photographer of Style.* Assisted by a team of professionals, Samson-Arcand will re-create as faithfully as possible Horst's work *Muriel Maxwell, Cover of American Vogue* (1 July 1939). The event offers a unique behind-the-scenes look at a professional fashion photo shoot and is being held in collaboration with Royal Photo and the Fashion & Design Festival. The clothing and accessories for the shoot are being graciously provided by Maison Ogilvy.

# Unveiling of the grand prize winner and finalists of the photo contest *Inspiration: Horst*

In conjunction with the exhibition, the photo contest *Inspiration: Horst* was launched to bring amateur and professional photographers together with fashion stylists, aficionados and fans to re-create a Horst shot.

Seven finalists were chosen by a jury comprised of Hélène Samson, Curator, Notman Photographic Archives, McCord Museum; Denis Desro, Fashion Editor-in-Chief, *ELLE Québec* and *ELLE Canada*; Stéphane Le Duc, Editor-in-Chief of the magazine *Dress to Kill*; Joanna Chryosocheris, founder and blogger of À *la vie,* À *la mode*; Sylvain Belisle, Art Director for Groupe Sensation Mode; and Georges Aubin of Royal Photo. A grand prize winner was also selected by jury members in July.

Visitors to the 2015 Fashion & Design Festival will have a chance to view the photo of the grand prize winner as well as those of the seven other finalists and are invited to vote for their favourite on the <u>Museum's Facebook page</u> until midnight on August 22, 2015. The entry garnering the most "Likes" in the online photo album will win a \$100 gift certificate at Royal Photo, a catalogue of the exhibition *Horst: Photographer of Style*, and a one-year Member+1 membership at the Museum (a total prize value of \$250).

This mini-exhibition of photos will be presented at a kiosk from **August 19 to 22**, **2015**, **from noon to 11 p.m.**, on Ste-Catherine Street West between Bleury and Jeanne-Mance. The photos are also on display at the LOEWS HÔTEL VOGUE until the end of August 2015.
