Photography Takes Centre Stage This Year at the McCord Stewart Museum

Montreal, August 18, 2022. – With the launch of two new photography exhibitions this fall, <u>INCIPIT – COVID-19</u> (opening September 16) and <u>Disraeli Revisited</u> (opening October 28), a new exhibition in the series Evolving Montreal, <u>Hochelaga-Maisonneuve</u> by photographer Joannie Lafrenière (opening March 31, 2023), the ongoing exhibition <u>Alexander Henderson – Art and Nature</u> and the last days of the exhibition <u>JJ Levine: Queer Photographs</u>, the McCord Stewart Museum is giving centre stage to the talent of Montreal photographers from the 18th to the 21st century. Also of note in February 2023 is the first exhibition at the McCord Stewart Museum by multidisciplinary artist <u>Karen Tam</u> as part of the Artist in Residence program. Additionally, the permanent exhibition <u>Indigenous Voices of Today: Knowledge, Trauma, Resilience</u> will feature new objects as a third of the hundred items presented in the three galleries will be rotated out in September for the first time.

EXHIBITIONS

<u>INCIPIT – COVID-19</u> – Photographs by Michel Huneault September 16, 2022, to January 22, 2023

The COVID-19 pandemic began in Quebec over two years ago. Conscious of the historic nature of the situation, the McCord Stewart Museum commissioned photographer Michel Huneault to capture the beginnings of this unprecedented upheaval. Named for the Latin word incipit, meaning "here begins," the exhibition recalls the early stages of the crisis.

Using a singular approach that intertwines several research and creation activities, photographer Michel Huneault chronicles various lived experiences in the public sphere, in private life and in hospital settings.

Activity related to the exhibition:

Documented in Real Time - Round table - September 21, 6 p.m. - At the Museum*

This event will examine the necessity of archiving the present and explore the roles of different stakeholders —artists, journalists, institutions, civil society—in establishing a network that participates in the values of accessibility and visibility.

<u>Disraeli Revisited – Chronicle of an Event in Quebec Photography</u> October 28, 2022, to February 19, 2023

The exhibition *Disraeli Revisited* will mark the 50th anniversary of a pivotal event in the history of documentary photography in Quebec: the Disraeli project. Created by a collective of young Montreal photographers and researchers—Claire Beaugrand-Champagne, Michel Campeau, Roger Charbonneau and Cedric Pearson, Maryse Pellerin and Ginette Laurin—this project is the result of a summer spent in the Disraeli region. The collective received a grant from the Opportunities for Youth federal aid program to represent everyday life in a rural Quebec community.

The group's photographs were circulated widely in the Quebec printed press, provoking a veritable media storm. In fact, influential residents of Disraeli claimed the town had been misrepresented by the photographers' "miserabilist" gaze. For the first time in Quebec, the ethics of photographic representation were subject to public debate.

Produced in collaboration with the project's four photographers, *Disraeli Revisited* aims to celebrate, expand on and revisit the original Disraeli project by bringing together photographs and documents that tell the story from multiple points of view.

The discussion will be moderated by Zoë Tousignant, Curator, Photography and curator of the exhibition, followed by an audience Q&A.

<u>Artist in Residence – Karen Tam</u> February 17 to August 13, 2023

As part of its Artist in Residence program, the Museum is pleased to welcome artist Karen Tam, whose research investigates different ways of building and representing cultural identity through installation, sculpture, textile and drawing. While deeply involved in archival and collections research, she came to wonder about the stories that are collected and told, and about the narratives that have been built around the Chinese diaspora. The artist will continue this line of inquiry within the Museum's collections.

This exhibition is presented as part of the Artist in Residence program, in collaboration with the Conseil des arts de Montréal.

<u>Hochelaga-Maisonneuve – Evolving Montreal</u> – Exhibition by Joannie Lafrenière March 31 to September 10, 2023

Through the lens of photographer and film director Joannie Lafrenière, this exhibition offers a colourful, sensitive portrait of the Hochelaga-Maisonneuve neighbourhood that takes viewers on an immersive photographic and cinematographic journey. An exhibition that documents places but also the relationships people have with a neighbourhood that has undergone many transformations over time.

<u>Joannie Lafrenière</u>, a proud resident of Hochelaga for some 15 years, is known for her humour-inflected and human-centred artistic practice.

With this exhibition, the Museum continues its program of photographic commissions titled Evolving Montreal. To document Montreal's ongoing urban transformation, the Museum is commissioning well-known local photographers to explore the changes occurring in a neighbourhood of their choice.

JJ Levine: Queer Photographs Until September 18, 2022

JJ Levine: Queer Photographs invites visitors to discover the work of Montreal photographer JJ Levine via a selection of portraits drawn from the series *Queer Portraits, Alone Time* and *Switch*. In his work, Levine interrogates the representation of traditional binary gender roles through photographs that feature queer individuals in the intimacy of a domestic setting.

<u>Eating Local</u> – Free – McGill College Avenue Until October 16, 2022

The annual photography exhibition is returning to McGill College Avenue, between Maisonneuve Boulevard and President Kennedy Avenue. Through 24 large-scale photographs from the McCord Stewart Museum's <u>Photography collection</u>, taken mainly in and around Montreal, *Eating Local* explores urban food practices from the 1860s to the 1990s.

This year, the exhibition is enhanced with audio content, accessible via the Musée McCord Museum's app. The application was developed in collaboration with Ivanhoé Cambridge.

Produced by the McCord Stewart Museum, Eating Local is presented by BMO Bank of Montreal in collaboration with Astral.



<u>Alexander Henderson – Art and Nature</u> Until April 16, 2023

The McCord Museum is presenting the first major exhibition devoted to the photographer Alexander Henderson (1831-1913). Captivated by the majesty of the territory's wilderness, Henderson would become one of the country's leading landscape photographers.

An invitation to follow the photographer's astonishing journey through the great outdoors and urban scenes, from his first excursions around Montreal and in the regions of Quebec—in particular the Outaouais, Gaspésie, Côte Nord and Saguenay–Lac-Saint-Jean, all the way to Western Canada. Alexander Henderson, who was born in Scotland, arrived in Montreal in 1855. Though he was operating in the same milieu as fellow photographers Notman and Livernois, the romanticism and aesthetic power of his work set him apart. *The exhibition is presented by Unis TV.*

<u>Photobook Club Montréal</u> invites photography fans to a workshop on assembling and making photography zines. They will present the different aspects of a photobook, especially the order of images, layout, and types of binding.

<u>Indigenous Voices of Today: Knowledge, Trauma, Resilience</u> Permanent exhibition

The exhibition bears witness to the still unrecognized knowledge of Indigenous peoples in Quebec and Canada as well as the deep wounds they carry and their incredible resilience. Visitors will discover about one hundred carefully selected objects combined with many powerful inspiring stories, allowing them to learn more about the lived reality of members of the 11 Indigenous nations of Quebec.

Fall 2022 will see the first rotation of objects in the exhibition. No fewer than 37 objects (a third of those currently presented in the exhibition) will return to the Museum's vaults to be replaced by a new series of breathtaking objects.

This exhibition, presented by ICI Radio-Canada, has been produced through a financial contribution from the program Aide aux projets pour le soutien des expositions permanentes of the Québec Cultural Heritage Fund of the Ministère de la Culture et des Communications du Québec.

The <u>Montreal Intercultural Storytelling Festival</u>, in collaboration with the Museum, invites the public to a new, exceptional series of stories narrated in the Innu language by Charles Api Bellefleur. Looking After Our Stories in Montréal/Tiohtiá:ke

Every Sunday from September 4 to November 20 – Free – At the Museum*

In this civic engagement workshop, created in collaboration with <u>Je suis Montréal</u>, participants will lend an ear to the too often untold stories of Chinese, Afro-descendant and Indigenous communities. Looking at photographs of 19th and 20th century Montreal from the McCord Stewart Museum's Photography collection, participants will reflect on the presence or absence of objects and people that support their wellbeing in Montreal. Their reflection will be facilitated by a bank of magnetic images to juxtapose with these cityscapes, which they will contribute to over the sessions. Each person will share their vision of a Montreal that they consider welcoming to them, while exploring and taking inspiration from others'.

The activity is presented in French and English, and is suitable for all ages.

This project is funded by the Ministère de l'Immigration, de la Francisation et de l'Intégration and the Ville de Montréal (Montréal Interculturel program).

Festival Quartiers Danses

The Festival Quartiers Danses is coming to the Museum! The public is invited to discover the artists from different backgrounds, who showcase contemporary dance in all its forms and hybrids. Three out-of-the-ordinary performances by three high-level choreographers will be presented.

National Day for Truth and Reconciliation – September 30

For the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, the Museum invites the public to join two activities:

This workshop, developed in response to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada, invites reflection on individual and collective actions that seek to create a conversation rather than to speak on behalf of those concerned. Participants will have the opportunity to reflect on the impact of colonization and take part in an intercultural process that opens up a dialogue for future generations.
