# **Connecting Montreal, Past and Present**

**Montreal, December 21, 2022.** – The McCord Stewart Museum is kicking off 2023 with programming that focuses firmly on Montreal's social history. In February, as part of the Artist-in-Residence program, multidisciplinary artist Karen Tam will revisit the history of Montreal's Chinese diaspora in her first exhibition at the Museum, <u>Swallowing Mountains</u>. In March, photographer Joannie Lafrenière will explore the evolution of one of Montreal's iconic neighbourhoods with her new exhibition, <u>Hochelaga</u>, part of the Evolving Montreal series. The winter-spring 2023 season will culminate with the works of Montreal painter James Duncan (1806-1881), an invaluable testimony to the city's accelerated transformation in the 19th century, presented at the Museum starting June 2. Digital artworks created by studio <u>Iregular</u> will punctuate the exhibition, creating a striking dialogue between the 19th and 21st centuries. An impressive lineup of cultural events for all audiences, reflecting Montreal's social and cultural diversity, will also fill the coming months with opportunities for exploration, reflection and artistic experimentation.

# **Exhibitions**

# Swallowing Mountains – An Exhibition by Karen Tam

## February 17 to August 13, 2023

As part of its Artist-in-Residence program, the Museum is pleased to welcome artist Karen Tam, whose research investigates different ways of building and representing cultural identity through installation, sculpture, textile and drawing. While deeply involved in archival and collections research, Karen Tam came to wonder about the stories that are collected and told, and about the narratives that have been built around the Chinese diaspora. In February 2023, at the end of her residency, the artist will present a solo exhibition on the relative absence in public archives and historical accounts of Chinese women from Montreal's Chinatown in the 19th and 20th centuries. The immersive installation will include works created by the artist for the occasion, objects belonging to members of the Chinatown community, and objects from the Museum's collections that inspired her.

This exhibition is presented as part of the Artist-in-Residence program, in collaboration with the Conseil des arts de Montréal.

## Hochelaga - Evolving Montreal by Joannie Lafrenière March 31 to September 10, 2023

Through the lens of photographer and film director <u>Joannie Lafrenière</u>, this exhibition offers a colourful, sensitive portrait of the Hochelaga neighbourhood that takes viewers on an immersive photographic, cinematographic and poetic journey. An exhibition that documents places but also the relationships people have with a neighbourhood that has undergone many transformations over time.

With this exhibition, the Museum continues its program of photographic commissions titled Evolving Montreal. To document Montreal's ongoing urban transformation, the Museum is commissioning well-known local photographers to explore the changes occurring in a neighbourhood of their choice.

## James Duncan (1806-1881) June 2, 2023, to April 21, 2024

James Duncan (1806–1881) was Montreal's painter par excellence in the mid-19th century. A faithful chronicler of Montreal life, he is known for his watercolours depicting picturesque panoramas and urban scenes.

## Wampum exhibition October 20, 2023, to March 10, 2024

The McCord Stewart Museum will present an exhibition dedicated to wampums produced by the musée du quai Branly - Jacques Chirac in Paris. In addition to bringing together wampums and other precious historical objects from the musée du quai Branly - Jacques Chirac, for the first time the exhibition will present the thirteen wampums from the McCord Stewart Museum's collection, as well as several others from Quebec and Canadian institutions. In this exhibition, the public is able to view an unprecedented number of wampums all in one place, objects that still play a fundamental role for some Indigenous nations in northeastern America. The participation of contemporary Indigenous artists in the exhibition will highlight the ongoing importance of wampum, celebrating the life of this object and its ongoing symbolism.

# Exhibitions to (re)visit

## Incipit - COVID-19 - Photographs by Michel Huneault

#### Last chance, until January 22, 2023

Through 30 works and 3 projections of photos and videos comprising over 150 images, the exhibition presents the daily reality of the first months of the pandemic as experienced by Montrealers, healthcare workers and patients suffering from the virus. *INCIPIT – COVID-19* is a chance for the public to reflect back on the series of events that put the world on pause, starting from the first outbreak.

## Disraeli Revisited – Chronicle of an Event in Quebec Photography

## Until February 19, 2023

The exhibition marks the 50th anniversary of this pivotal event in the history of Quebec photography. Through 144 photographs, including over 67 that have never been exhibited before, 44 archival documents and a video, the public is invited to discover the Disraeli project, the topic of heated debate in the 1970s that sparked a deep reflection on representativeness and image rights. Through this exhibition, the Museum intends at once to celebrate, expand and revisit the original corpus by bringing together images and objects that tell the story from multiple points of view.

## <u> Alexander Henderson – Art and Nature</u>

#### Until April 16, 2023

The McCord Museum is presenting the first major exhibition devoted to the photographer Alexander Henderson (1831-1913). An invitation to follow the photographer's astonishing journey through the great outdoors and urban scenes, from his first excursions around Montreal and in the regions of Quebec. Though he was operating in the same milieu as fellow photographer William Notman, the romanticism and aesthetic power of his work set him apart.

The exhibition is presented by <u>Unis TV</u>. This project was made possible thanks to Library and Archives Canada's Documentary Heritage Communities Program.

## Indigenous Voices of Today: Knowledge, Trauma, Resilience

## Permanent exhibition

The exhibition bears witness to the still unrecognized knowledge of Indigenous peoples in Quebec and Canada as well as the deep wounds they carry and their incredible resilience. Visitors will discover about one hundred carefully selected objects combined with many powerful inspiring stories, allowing them to learn more about the lived reality of members of the 11 Indigenous nations of Quebec.

Their reflection will be facilitated by a bank of magnetic images to juxtapose with these cityscapes, which they will contribute to over the sessions. Each participant will share their vision of a Montreal/Tiohtiá:ke in which they feel welcome and discover and find inspiration in those shared by others.

# McCord Museum Foundation: Return of the Ball and the Sugar Ball

After a three-year break, the <u>Annual Ball</u> and the <u>Sugar Ball</u> will be back in 2023 to celebrate Montreal in style and will take place respectively on Thursday May 4 and Saturday May 6 at l'Arsenal. Each year, the McCord Museum Foundation organizes the Annual Ball and the Sugar Ball for the McCord Stewart Museum. The Annual Ball is the largest fundraising event for the Museum, where more than 500 people from Montreal's business, cultural and philanthropic communities come together to celebrate the Museum with elegance. In 2019, the two events collectively raised \$1,000,000 for the McCord Stewart Museum.

# **Opening of Café Notman**

Located at the McCord Stewart Museum, <u>Café Notman</u> officially opened its doors on December 1, 2022. Wanting to pay tribute to the great photographer William Notman (1826-1891), the team of <u>Olive Orange</u>, managing the Café, offers a fresh menu featuring local, healthy ingredients.

Located in the cultural heart of Montreal, in a brand new decor and a welcoming atmosphere, Café Notman is the fruit of collaboration between the Museum, <u>Aanagram</u>, a studio that specializes in branding and interior design, and the internationally known graphic design and strategy firm <u>Paprika</u>. In line with its sustainable development policy, the McCord Stewart Museum recycled and reused the material replaced during the renovation of the Café, while following a policy of local procurement. The chairs and light fixtures, designed in Montreal, come respectively from <u>Essai</u> and <u>Luminaires Authentik</u>. Cabinetmakers <u>Échardes & Copeaux</u> and <u>Martine Gougeon</u> modernized the counters. Customers will be able to admire the faithful reproduction of the neon sign advertising Notman & Sons studio, which formerly hung over Sherbrooke Street West.
