TELL A LEGEND LEARN, CREATE AND SHARE A LIVING STORY PARTICIPATORY WORKSHOP AT THE MUSEUM

Duration: 45 minutes

Target audience: French learners (French courses for immigrants)

Target learning levels: Levels 4 and 5 (course 2)

DESCRIPTION OF THE ACTIVITY

Developed in collaboration with Wapikoni mobile, the workshop helps learners discover the tales and legends of Canada's Indigenous nations by developing a sense of living stories.

A mobile production studio for First Nations audiovisual creation and education, Wapikoni mobile is a cultural mediation organization that aims to build bridges and foster encounters and exchanges between members of First Nations communities and non-Indigenous individuals. Through its innovative actions, Wapikoni mobile facilitates cultural reappropriation and expression for some and cultural discovery for others.

During the workshop, learners will explore the **concrete topics of wildlife, values and personality traits in colloquial language** and make connections with their activities, interests and personal experiences.

Developed in close collaboration with the **full-time francization team in the continuing education and corporate training group at Cégep du Vieux Montréal**, this workshop is especially adapted to **levels 4 and 5 (course 2)**

Learners will take part in:

- an **identification activity** while watching a video;
- a guided discussion about the concept of values;
- an **informal presentation** during which volunteer learners will explain their concept of values.
