PARTICIPATORY WORKSHOP AT THE MUSEUM

Length: 60 minutes

Target audience: 2nd and 3rd cycles of Elementary school – 1st cycle of Secondary school

Educational areas: Social sciences – Personal development (ethics and religion) – Languages – Arts

DESCRIPTION OF THE ACTIVITY

Developed in collaboration with the Wapikoni Mobile organization, this workshop enables participants to discover the tales and legends of Canada's Indigenous peoples by developing their sense of living stories. A mobile studio for First Nations audio-visual creation and training, Wapikoni Mobile is a cultural mediation organization that seeks to build bridges and foster encounters and exchanges between members of First Nations and non-Indigenous people. Through its innovative actions, Wapikoni Mobile facilitates the appropriation and expression of culture for some and the discovery of that culture for others.
